As they progress through our curriculum, we aim for our children to develop their knowledge and understanding about some of the greatest British artists that the music industry has ever produced. We aspire to immerse them in famous theatre productions and expand their experiences of music across a range of genres.

Our approach to teaching and learning in music intends to allow every child to listen and appraise, compose and perform in a progressive way that engages their independence and resilience. We hope that through the teaching of music at Chapel End Primary School, that we inspire our children to learn to play a musical instrument and continue to build on the solid foundations which we have helped them to build.

Children listen to music at snack time, and they are encouraged to comment on what they can hear and how it makes them feel. They listen t a range of genres relating to topics we are exploring e.g. Handel's firework music in November and Vivaldi's Four Seasons when the seasons change.

This will continue to be an opportunity for us to develop - we will need equipment in the snack area to facilitate this.

Children listen to calming music at various points during the day and we talk about the positive impact on our bodies and how we feel.

The children listen to calming music as they enter the classroom in the morning and again at home time. These are usually calming songs and nursery rhymes.

We move to music on a daily basis in a number of different ways e.g. Funky Fingers.

The children listen and move to music on a daily basis in Funky fingers. The songs are played for a week and comprise of a variety of genres of music - many of them are British artists.

Position Statement

School has a whole-school music overview in place. This overview is contextual to the school. It is supported by the 'Charanga' scheme of work. Further to this, school has selected a progression for festive music, musical theatre and 'home grown' music. These additions allow all children to explore the modern history of British music and musical theatre.

School has a clear progression document in place for Year 1- Year 6 which is based upon the Charanga Scheme of work.

Composing

Progression of knowledge includes: Listening and appraising Singing Playing Improvisation Composition

Performance

Children have at least 45 minutes of music teaching and learning each week. In addition to this, children experience singing opportunities and opportunities to listen to and appraise music in 2 weekly assemblies.

Children are introduced to tuned instruments in Year 1 in the form of the glockenspiel.

In the Summer term in Year 2, children progress on to woodwind in the form of recorder tuition. This continues in to Year 3 during the Autumn term.

In Year 4, children receive wholeclass specialist music tuition through St Helens Music Service. In 2024-2025 children will be taught how to play the ukulele.

Every class-based music lesson begins with either: a song by a home grown star, a musical theatre masterpiece or a piece of music from a specific music genre.

Each class has the opportunity to perform their genre song at Chapel End Spring Song each year.

Each class at Chapel End Primary begins the day with a song chosen by the class. This is a song chosen to 'cue in' the day in a positive manner supporting each child's ability to be ready to learn.

The Computing curriculum at Chapel End Primary also supports children's musical development. In Year 2 children complete
